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Overview

- established in 1997 and has assisted First Nation
 Citizens (for over seventeen years) to stay in or reenter the labour force
- acts as a Local Delivery Mechanism (LDM) under the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) Anishinabek -Aboriginal Skills and Employment Strategy (ASETS)
- part of a network of nine Local Delivery Mechanism's (LDM's) with Fort William First Nation, and collectively includes 25 First Nations
- Incorporated in 2009 and includes direct programs and services for 9 member First Nation Communities (within the North Superior Region) or approximately 8,000 First Nation Citizens



Overview...cont'd

- Delivers employment and training programs for the First
 Nation Citizens who are from the following communities:
 - Animbiigoo Zaagi'igan Anishinaabek (Lake Nipigon Ojibway)
 - Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek (Rocky Bay First Nation)
 - Bingwi Neyaashi Anishinaabek (Sand Point First Nation)
 - Kiashke Zaaging Anishinaabek (Gull Bay First Nation)
 - Michipicoten First Nation
 - Ojibways of the Pic River First Nation
 - Pays Plat First Nation
 - Pic Mobert First Nation
 - Red Rock Indian Band

ASETS

- Aboriginal Skills and Employment Strategy (ASETS) is all about an integrated approach to Aboriginal Labour Market programming that links training to labour market demand and ensures that Canada's Aboriginal People can fully participate in economic opportunities
 - 57 ASETA Holders in Canada (of which 18 are in Ontario) representing approximately 850,000
 Citizens living in their own communities or in urban areas
