Aboriginal Group and Partners Collaborate to Develop Entrepreneur Career Paths for Aboriginal Youth

July 4, 2014 --- Anishinabek Employment and Training Services (AETS), in partnership with the Northwestern Ontario Innovation Centre (NOIC) and the Nishnawbe Aski Development Fund (NADF), are proud to announce the launch of SAYbiz business program focusing on Entrepreneurship, Social Enterprise and Business Development. The collaboration will engage and design a business network made up of 18 Aboriginal Youth from nine First Nation communities. The Aboriginal Youth will be gathered to begin developing an entrepreneurial culture for their home First Nation community and/or High School. The team will be provided with entrepreneurial education in cooperation with other stakeholders, along with experiences and activities.

The program which started on July 2, 2014 includes access to a laptop and a one-week pre-program orientation and one-week mid-summer retreat in Thunder Bay. The culturally aware and responsive program also involves an Elder, Mentor, Facilitator, Instructors, Classroom and Research Enrichment Activities and regular Monitors for the creation of Social Enterprises and a High School Entrepreneur Club(s). Participants will receive a certificate and advanced standing towards a course in Business at Confederation College.

"This initiative will provide First Nation Citizens with the stepping stones required to build skills and gain the knowledge needed to realize their entrepreneurship goals and dreams. It's important that we continue to be the leader in the development of training programs that meet the needs of the First Nation communities," said John DeGiacomo, Executive Director of the AETS.

Mutually beneficial partnerships like this one with NOIC and NADF will increase First Nation self reliance and contribute to ongoing improvements to the overall well being of First Nation individuals, families and communities in Northwestern Ontario. AETS successful secured funding for the development of the pilot program through FedNor and the Government of Ontario.

Participants who successfully complete the program requirements will receive Certificates of Achievement. SAYbiz is a unique and meaningful opportunity for Aboriginal Youth to develop their entrepreneurship skills and explore their personal and cultural identity. The initiative will help to increase engagement and achievement, encourage participation in extra-curricular activities, and increase the number of Aboriginal role models visible in school and communities. As Aboriginal Youth come to understand their roles as leaders and ambassadors for change within their communities, a positive, caring and safe school and community climate will be fostered, conducive to both learning and personal growth and development

Culturally-appropriate academic and workplace supports are provided to participants through mentorship, guidance and additional supports as required.
