THE ISSUE

- The average age of all AETS clients enrolled in SPF employment programs was 36 years.
- LMI data reveals that only 18 % of citizens, 30 to 34 years has a high school diploma / equivalent.
- LMI data reveals that only 27 % of citizens, 20 to 29 years has a high school diploma / equivalent.
- Stats Can data from 2016 reveals that only 39 % of Indigenous people, 18 to 20 years has a high school diploma / equivalent.

THE VISION

Develop / prototype / measure the impact and evolve a six-year innovation that targets specific contributing factors within the system of education to employment that result in a 60% nongraduation rate of youth, 15 to 25 years, is the primary barrier to employment opportunities that results in Indigenous poverty, and numerous socio-cultural issues.







The Strategy – Strengthening the System of Education to Employment

- 1. Engage Indigenous students, 15 to 18 years of age, currently attending high school in a process of consultation that reveals an Effective Teachers Profile, or how they want teachers to work with them.
- 2. Engage Indigenous youth, 19 to 25 years of age, who have left high school without a diploma in a process of consultation that reveals a re-entry program that includes a summer employment, credit earning opportunities, skills, etc.
- 3. Develop and deliver a 4-year plan of in-service professional development for teachers in the selected high school in 5 boards of education that serve the 9 AETS First Nations that results in teachers that are able to teach within Indigenous values and beliefs.
- Integrate multiple exposures for both demographic groups of youth with opportunities to explore future employment, employment training and future education possibilities.

Identify Current Reality

- Set up Project Advisory Group
- Set up Youth Advisory Group
- Ongoing throughout
- Gather relevant research & data to determine the baseline for Indigenous youth retention in NWO

Present Proposed Design

- Present proposed project plan to the 9 AETS FN communities
- Including the current local education data, proposed events and PD plan



Start Collaborative Initiatives

- Meet with 9FN Education Directors
- Ask for all relevant data including high school graduation rates, related tuition transfers, etc. for past 5 years
- Identify 2-4 youth to participate in project
- Identify a community Elder

Particpation in Engagement Circles

- 2nd meeting with 9 FN Education Directors to review findings and idea engagement
- Meet with the 5 District School Board
- representatives in another information gathering Engagement Circle

Begin Development

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 Compile and analyze all feedback of Engagement Circle findings and prepare initial recommendations



2 day Youth Gathering

- Gathering of youth, Elders and engageed community representatives
- Facilitation of key interactive workshops
- Gather youth perspectives on key findings and possible challenges and solutions

Meeting with Business/Industry Partners

- Preparation and facilitation of Engagement Circle
- Determine pathways between education and employment opportunities

Review & Refine Action Plan

- Compile, tabulate key findings
- Evaluate and revise ongoing vision and next steps




